5. <u>Regulations</u>

5.1.Eligibility for Admission

The minimum number of credits to be acquired by a student for obtaining a degree shall be 136. This may be enhanced to 138 by increasing one credit each to two of the Skill Enhancement Courses, *Literary Criticism* and *Linguistics*.

The two Generic Electives with a credit of four each shall be done in a subject/discipline other than English.

The Department of English shall offer English for Communication and English for Competitive Examinations as Generic Electives. In addition, two more courses, Effective English Speaking Skills and Technical Writing, are proposed to be kept under reserve, should a demand arise.
